### ACPE strategic plan

The Board of Representatives met Nov. 4–8 in Atlanta, Ga., and continued to structure its work around the Strategic Plan for ACPE. Areas of discussion are summarized below.

#### Development and fund raising

received considerable attention, marked by intense focus, curiosity, and sometimes spirited exchange, and focused on the relationship between the ACPE and the FCPE. Several persons spoke to the matter: Art Schmidt, Neal Myerberg, Deborah Whisnand, Ted Hodge, Paula Teague and numerous board members. Several persons were concerned about the lack of clarity between the boards, especially relative to matters of power, control and accountability. Because of the necessity that FCPE be a separate legal entity, Paula stated that the ACPE Board can only "recommend" to the FCPE; but FCPE takes these recommendations "seriously." Relative to the issue, the board passed a motion that "to strengthen the interface between the two organizations, the ACPE Board requests that the ACPE's president and executive director sit on the FCPE Personnel Committee to evaluate the FCPE executive director." Also passed was a motion stating that "a risk analysis and exit strategy" for the Board of Reps' approved capital campaign be included in the existing business plan and be submitted by Jan. 15, 2010, by the FCPE to be reviewed and approved by the ACPE Board." As I would say to my students after a conflicted and complex session: to be continued.

President-Elect Sally Schwab noted the need to get members more focused on the Annual Fund. Dennis Kenny and Agnes Bourne reported for the Development

Committee's facilities group on an effort to identify and fund a project to create a new ACPE national office. They reported on three models situated in the Atlanta area: a retreat center, an urban building and a campus. Board members visited an urban location, plus the existing national office. The urban setting clearly would require extensive renovation. (Note: Rehabbing can often cost more than purchasing a new structure.) Also suggested was acquisition of additional condo space contiguous to the existing office. As noted above: to be continued.

#### Changes to supervisory education and certification

will be addressed by a new task force, which the board approved, utilizing the 2007 SERC report. The intent is to strengthen supervisory education, refine the certification process and reduce cost. The task force is to bring recommendations to the November 2010 Board meeting. The board also approved start-up funds for the creation of an ACPE Academy. The Academy would emphasize four areas: leadership forum, center for management studies, center for supervisory and teaching arts, institute for international CPE.

The Certification Commission believes that a three-member certifying committee is not feasible, would do little to reduce costs and would hamper quality. Chair Jan Humphreys noted that during this year, more Associate Supervisors appeared for the final review at the regional level (7) than at the national (5). At present, more than 200 persons are in the credentialing process. The Commission continues to work on the position paper process. At the current meeting, 11 requests were granted and 6 denied (65%).

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#### Contextual and pastoral education

The board voted to remove the Chaplaincy of Full Gospel Churches as a certified Endorsing Agency for military chaplains. The board action was based on complaints made by the Military Religious Freedom Foundation, including denigration of other religious entities; ties to extremist groups and statements against the government; and practice of proselytizing in Iraq and Afghanistan, contrary to a general order by CENTCOM. The New Generations Project is funding a summer 2010 CPE unit in Kenya to be conducted by Cal Brand. Accreditation Chair Karrie Oertli led a workshop for all leadership relating to utilization of electronic transmission of the annual Center Reports and eventual electronic transmission of other related materials and reports.

#### Multicultural and international learning

Note the above reference to the CPE Unit to be conducted in Kenya during the summer 2010. On the recommendation of the Multicultural Education Work Group, the board voted to accept the Crisis Center, Nairobi, Kenya.

The next REM conference will be in San Antonio, February 2010, with the theme *Living in a Post-Racial Society: Race, Ethnicity, Diversity and Empowerment in Clinical Pastoral Education*.

## Organizational relationships in pastoral care

Seminary Rep Jan McCormack reminded the board of the importance of sustaining relationships with member seminaries. She has become aware of irritation related to seminary/ACPE relationships. Some seminaries view us as arrogant, not a colleague but a competitor, mistrustful of seminary processes, practices and requirements, and not listening to them. Although these comments originate from only a few seminaries, they remind us of the need not to take these relationships for granted.

The board discussed the *ACPE Self-Study of Organizational Structure (SOS)*. There was agreement among the regions about various survey items. **Areas** viewed as a no brainer: no alcohol, use of technology, accessible meeting locations, leadership meetings in Atlanta. **Themes** included: impressed that we are about this, grateful to be in the conversation, feel strongly that certification should remain at REM meetings, be thoughtful not to lose primary culture and mission for cost savings, certification is the most important and expensive thing we do, re-examine the Certification Study, tension between the regions and national organization. **Concerns:** certification should stay the way it is; don't reduce sub-committees from 5 to 3 except for extensions, lots of money being spent at the national level, organizational solvency—particular focus on FCPE, very concerned about rearranging regions, passionate about identity, definitely keep at-large positions, all meetings in Atlanta—split.

## Awards

The board awarded the Distinguished Service Award to **Denise Haines** and the Helen Flanders Dunbar Award jointly to **Jim Corrigan** and **David Myler**. Supervisor Emeritus status was granted to **Joel Hempel** and **Jim Gunn**.

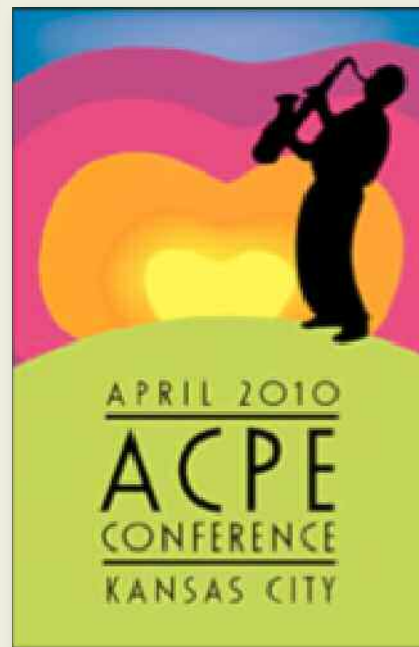

### Plenary speakers

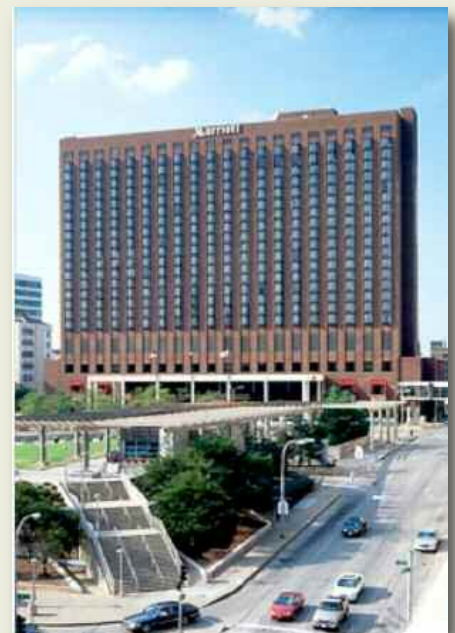
**Thomas Armstrong, Ph.D.** is an award-winning author and speaker with more than 30 years' teaching experience from primary through the doctoral levels, and over one million copies of his books in print on issues related to learning and human development. He is the author of 13 books including *The Human Odyssey*:

*Navigating the Twelve Stages of Life, The Best Schools: How Human Development Research Should Inform Educational Practice, Multiple Intelligences in the Classroom, In Their Own Way, Awakening Your Child's Natural Genius, 7 Kinds of Smart, The Myth of the A.D.D. Child, ADD/ADHD Alternatives in the Classroom, and Awakening Genius in the Classroom*. His books have been translated into 24 languages, including Spanish, Chinese, Hebrew, Danish and Russian. He has written for *Ladies Home Journal, Family Circle* (where he received awards from the Educational Press Association and the National Association of Secondary School Principals), *Parenting* (where he was a regularly featured columnist), *Mothering* (where he was a contributing editor), and more than 30 other periodicals, journals and edited books. Armstrong has appeared on several national and international television and radio programs, including NBC's *The Today Show, CBS This Morning, CNN, the BBC* and *The Voice of America*.

**Maureen Walker, Ph.D.** is a licensed psychologist with an independent practice in psychotherapy and multicultural consultation in Cambridge, Mass. She is Director of Program Development at the Jean Baker Miller Training Institute of the Stone Center at Wellesley College as well as an Associate Director in MBA Support Services at Harvard Business School. The author of several working papers in the Stone Center Works in Progress Series, Walker has also written several articles and textbook chapters. Meeting called to order by Regional  
Chair Wayne Van Kampen. Wayne invited  
first-time attendees to introduce them-  
selves. Inba Inbarasu and Jamie Beachy  
did so, and were welcomed.

Wayne expressed thanks to those who  
had worked on the organization of this  
annual regional meeting.

The Minutes from the Richmond, Va.,  
meeting were adopted as published.

Bill Russell moved adoption of the  
agenda. Seconded and carried.

## Accreditation

Jim Bennett reported that the committee  
met Wednesday and Thursday. Accredita-  
tion Commission meeting actions are on-  
line. Notations/suspensions at VA in KC  
have been lifted—Paula Gold supervisor.  
Centura has new component site, St. An-  
thony's North—Janet Barriger supervisor.  
Shawnee Mission Medical Center moved  
from satellite to accredited center—Victor  
Wilson supervisor. Each region was asked  
to nominate three persons to train as na-  
tional site team chairs. We now have two  
who have accepted: Barbara Brumleve and  
Alan Bowman, to be trained in Atlanta in  
November, with Jim Bennett and Stu  
Plummer (all chairs and RDs are to be  
trained). Jim invited anyone interested in  
being trained as a site team chair to let  
him know. Beginning 2010, site visits will

have national site team chairs plus two  
members from the region. Question was  
raised if the process will change? Jim be-  
lieves the process will not change much.  
Encouraged membership to reference the  
manual online.

Jim drew attention to action taken at  
the Spring Regional Council meeting, when  
we voted to impose \$50 penalty for annual  
center reports submitted after Jan. 15.

The committee is preparing for two site  
reviews: a 10-year at University of Col-  
orado Hospital, the other an initial review  
for St. John's Hospital, Springfield, Mo., to  
move from satellite to accredited center.

A center has self-reported a violation  
of standards. This was referred to the Ac-  
creditation Commission.

Jim explained the recommendation to  
adjust review dates in an attempt to aver-  
age out the number of reviews in any  
given year. Standards allow two-year  
reset; a change will continue to allow a  
one year reset, if necessary.

**Reminder:** Annual Reports due Jan. 15  
to the Accreditation Committee Chair.

## Board of Representatives

Jim Daugherty and Garrett Starmer  
reported. The board has not met since our  
February meeting in Orlando. They did  
have a conference call that was primarily  
for approval of new standards. There was  
an extended discussion around possible  
move of headquarters, now looking in  
Atlanta. Sheila Hammond will be a part  
of a review of two possible sites.

Garrett and Jim reported on feedback  
received from the *Self-Study of Organiza-  
tional Structure (SOS)* committee who met  
the previous day. They distributed results  
from the form and invited discussion by

the body. The comments were unavailable at this time; they offered to e-mail those comments and invited more. **Question:** Have any of these been enacted already? Yes—newsletter is already electronic. Others are still in conversation. **Comment/question:** The biggest concerns were items that deal with representation. Will that change our form of government as representative from regions? Answer: Barry Shain keeps saying we have a Board of Directors; we need to keep distinguishing—it is a Board of Representatives. Association IS looking at regional structure—do we need two representatives from each region? Response: That would be a significant change. Those areas have elicited most discussion in the Board. **Comment:** This feels like a cultural change for an organization that values relationships, conversations, etc. If we become strictly task-oriented, we lose more than money. **Question:** How many decisions are regional, how many national? Response: Focus is entirely national. There is especially concern about breaking up regions, where camaraderie is developed and grassroots leadership is developed. **Comment:** **Concern** expressed for reducing Certification committees from 5 to 3; with only 3, one very strong committee member can much more easily dominate. With 5, there is less likelihood this can happen. **Comment:** We need to make it very clear at the national level that we are a thriving region. Sally reported from discussions in the task force: Persons are looking at regional boundary definition for the primary reason to lower numbers on commissions, committees, and boards. Secondly, the NE Region struggles with sufficient personnel to serve on their committees. Occasionally, we do, too. Some of the larger regions may feel we have more representation than they do, because we each have two reps but our memberships are unequal. There was some discussion of changing all the boundaries. Membership spoke strongly against raising fees, so the SOS team was created to cut costs to gain efficiency and to prevent losing what we value. **Comment:** These are major

changes. Some felt we had insufficient time for the membership to talk about it. The board will vote before the membership can discuss. We were reminded that Jim Daugherty and Garrett will represent what we have said at the Board of Reps and that these actions are built into the budget which WILL be discussed. Our board representatives were requested to ask for time to discuss before we vote on the budget. Discussion was closed by our Chair because of time constraints.

### Standards

Sheila Hammond. New Standards take effect January 2010. Highlights: now a Definition of Terms rather than multiple glossaries. No bound copy; it will come on three-hole binder paper, one copy per supervisor. Appendix 19 is replaced by Appendix 5; Committee hopes and believes it is more user friendly. Manuals are online now.

### Certification

Barbara Brumleve expressed thanks to Jim Gunn for a smooth transition in leadership. We have 12 or 13 in the supervisory education process; Tanya Hammer-Luken, Chuck Orme-Rogers and Strother Gross were in attendance. Susan Heller was certified as Candidate, Julie Swaney's certification was re-activated. Barbara has looked at the new *Certification Manual* online; biggest changes are around the readiness consultation; a few deadlines have changed; theory papers instructions are improved. Deadlines are now by postmark date, not date received.

### Ethics

Frances McWilliams reported a lot of activity this summer, but the commission has not met. One case in this region is proceeding. One complaint in this region has been referred to Certification Commission for a competency review. Frances mentioned that pre-conference workshops for the national 2010 meeting are for leadership but open to all. One will be about students who are too damaged to learn. Pilot project now has enough cases to evaluate the new process, which is now in the manual.

### REM

John Blair reported a conference call in August regarding the next meeting in San Antonio. They want intentionally to recognize Latino and other diverse voices. John will be parliamentarian at the business meeting.

### Clinical members

Sharon Weissman: no report.

### Nominations

Chuck Robertson, Stu Plummer reporting. Chuck expressed thanks to Wayne and Stu for providing consultation and deep sadness for the loss of Art Lucas as a member of nominations. Chuck presented a slate in writing. Bill Russell moved closing nominations. Seconded, carried. Jim Daugherty moved adoption of slate; seconded, carried.

Nominations from the floor were invited for Board of Representatives: Sheila Hammond was elected. Sheila then resigned as Chair of Standards. Nominations were accepted for replacement of Sheila. Dean Dyk and Inba Inbarasu were nominated. Inba was elected Chair of Standards to replace Sheila.

Tania Hammer-Luken moved to rescind election of a chair elect. Seconded. Discussion included concerns that nominee Jim Harper was not present at this meeting had been absent at recent meetings. As a result there are many persons in the region who do not know him. Questions were raised about how he was nominated. Stu reported that Chuck expressed Jim's interest during a conference call with Chuck, Wayne and Stu (no other committee members). A vote was called, with 11 in favor to 15 against. A 2/3 majority was required to overturn the election. Wayne agreed as chair to contact Jim to share concerns of the regional membership as he prepares to assume the position of chair elect.

Nominations were requested for Board of Reps Alternate for 2010. Janet Barriger, Shannon Borchert and Dean Dyk were nominated. Janet Barriger was elected.

### Regional director report

Stu Plummer expressed thanks to Jackie for four years of service as Chair of the Region. Thanks also expressed to Garrett

as member of Board and Council, Jim Gunn as Certification Chair and Council; to Joel Hempel who completed two terms on Accreditation and rotates off, and to Bill Russell who has served two terms on Certification and rotates off. Karen Fieser, who served a term on Accreditation, chose with regret not to serve a second term because of family concerns.

Reserves of Region were transferred from the Vanguard Money Market to FCPE Endowment as a restricted fund of \$63,035.47; as of 8/31/09 it was \$63,642.40. We are the second Region to transfer funds into the FCPE; two other regions anticipate a transfer. Stu explained that this protects our reserves from legal threats, offers a potentially greater return and by increasing size of the endowment impresses possible foundation and corporate donors. Additionally, the fees for management of the endowment are lessened as the corpus grows.

Sage Creative is now our webmaster and electronic newsletter designer—a significant improvement. There is some increase in expense; some are about one time start-up fees that are being managed by reducing issues this year by one.

Charlie Hart is coming back to Region to begin a Center at St. John's Hospital, Springfield, Ill.

Financial reports were accepted. Stu called for Student Unit Reports for the summer '09 if they have not yet submitted.

### Regional meeting 2010

Sheila Hammond reported she and Jim Daugherty are exploring places in St. Louis, Mo. Will revisit dates in light of Jewish high holiday dates.

### National 2010

Sally Schwab and John Pumphrey asked for volunteers and thanked members for feedback about the Marriott Downtown.

Council actions reported:

- RD evaluation came in at 98.4 = "the high edge of excellence."
- Stu proposed a Fiscal Plan for 2011. Council decided to make no changes in fee structure for the time being. Discussion of an increase in Richmond and by Council in March '09 has been reconsidered with a decision not to increase. Discussion was invited. Bill Russell moved to ratify Council's adoption of a Fiscal Plan for 2011. Seconded and carried.

Sheila Hammond moved acceptance of all previous reports. Seconded and carried.

Members were asked to return lanyards and name badges.

Meeting adjourned with thanks and blessings by Chair Wayne Van Kampen.
